

Some Prayers and Readings on Visiting the Re-Opened Cemetery

It is customary when visiting the grave or resting place of a loved one to place a stone. You may wish to select a stone from your home, or from another special place, to take with you. Some people (adults and children) paint such stones before taking them. If you feel this, or something similar, might help, please do it. If you aren't sure whether something would be within the rules or guidelines of the cemetery, do please check with your Rabbi.

For a Visit After Lockdown

(Lines 2 and 3 are specific to a visit after a funeral at which family could not be present)

My heart was pained by your dying;
[My soul was torn by not being with you on your final journey;
My tears felt like they fell in the wrong place.]
A bit of me knew we were together in spirit;
A bit of me always felt distance did not matter;
A lot of me yearned to be close in any way possible.
Now, at last, I can be physically near you.

The Memorial Prayer

El Malei Rachamim - O God, full of compassion, exalted God, grant perfect rest under the wings of Your presence to our loved ones who have gone to their eternal home. Merciful God, grant them Your protection for ever and let their souls be bound up in the bond of eternal life. The Eternal One is their inheritance. May they rest in peace, and let us say: *Amen*.
